

Texas A&M University FAQs Regarding Freshman Admission for Fall 2007 Semester

What are the "best tips" to give to a prospective student/family?

During High School

Take SAT and/or ACT early and repeat if necessary—send scores to Texas A&M.

Take college prep, AP, Honors classes and extra electives.

Get involved in high school and community activities—record participation/leadership.

For Texas A&M Admission

Apply early—Texas Common Application (www.applytexas.org) available Sept. 1.

Complete the entire application and answer essay questions A and B—we accept a resume (if more space is needed than the application provides) and letters of recommendation as well.

Contact Texas A&M (see list of Prospective Student Centers) in preparing application.

Submit an official high school transcript with class rank.

How are students admitted to Texas A&M?

Three ways:

- Top 10% graduates from recognized Texas high schools admitted by law (all required credentials must be submitted before the application deadline).
- Academic Admits—1300 SAT with writing sample (600 or better on both math and critical reading) or 30 ACT with writing sample (27 or better on both math and English) and in the top 25% of their class with college prep courses from Texas HS.
- All other applications are reviewed.

What is the admission process from application through review to decision?

All completed applications received by the application deadline are processed. To check the status of application completion, go to the website (applicant.tamu.edu). There is a nonrefundable \$60 processing fee or fee waiver required. Top 10% and Academic Admits receive a notice of admission within 3-4 weeks. Individual students are considered by rolling reviews beginning in late fall—students are notified of admission or remain in review status until final review decisions are made. Final review decisions are announced in late March/early April—some applicants are offered Wait List status or participation in the Blinn TEAM Program.

How do most students apply?

Over 90% of applications are received electronically through www.applytexas.org, however, there is no preference given to electronic over paper applications.

What are the critical deadlines for admission for Fall term?

Dec. 1: Choice of major preference given to Top 10% and Academic Admits.

Feb. 1: All credentials must be <u>received</u> (Freshman Admissions Processing office).

What is considered in the individual review of an applicant?

There is a holistic review including an "Academic Index" and "Subjective Analysis." In subjective analysis, categories are Personal Achievement (extracurricular involvement, talents, awards, employment, volunteerism, leadership, etc.) and Distinguishing Characteristics (scholastic achievement in the student's educational environment, cultural contributions, etc.). Data on legacy is not collected nor considered although some students write in the essays about family members' connections to Texas A&M.

How is "association to Texas A&M" utilized?

An academic association to Texas A&M—meeting with Admissions Counselors on campus or at a regional Prospective Student Center, campus visit, Aggieland Saturday or Corps programs, interviews with faculty or staff in colleges or departments—is considered in holistic review.

Are students from small schools at a disadvantage?

No, students who have attended small/private/home schools are encouraged to apply—because the school rank may be skewed or may not exist, other academic criteria are carefully evaluated. Personal achievement criteria are considered in context of high school opportunities.

Are letters of recommendation helpful?

Yes, although letters are optional, all materials in the application file are considered. Submit no more than two.

What is different for Transfer students? International students?

How and when do students apply for Financial Aid?

Students will first need to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) either on line (www.fafsa.ed.gov) or via the paper application, available after January 1 for the upcoming academic year. Be sure to add Texas A&M University's school code 003632. We encourage students to submit the FAFSA to the federal processor as early as possible and before our March 31 priority date. We strongly recommend that students utilize the online application. After we receive the electronic results fro the federal processor, we will then send the student a request for any additional documentation we may need.

Do students have to wait until they are admitted before they apply for financial aid?

Students do not have to be admitted to TAMU in order to file the FAFSA. However, a financial aid offer will not be made until a student has been fully admitted. Students do not have to be admitted to any institution before applying for financial aid.
