Imported Fire Ant in Hay Quarantine in Effect

There are 163 Texas counties quarantined for Imported Fire Ant (IFA). Under Texas Administrative Code, Title 4, Chapter 19, Subchapter J, hay from counties infested by IFA are prohibited from being moved into non-infested counties unless the hay has been stored on a concrete slab or heavy duty plastic and the premises where it was stored was kept free of IFA using appropriate bait treatments recommended by the Texas AgriLife Extension Service imported fire ant research and management project's Web site http://fireant.tamu.edu.

The list of quarantined counties is located online at www.tda.state.tx.us. Quarantined counties may also be determined by calling 1-800-TELL-TDA. Hay from noninfested counties can be certified based upon the county of hay origin. Prior to movement of hay from an infested county to a non-infested county in Texas, or another state, the hay producer or shipper must contact his or her local Texas Department of Agriculture office to have the hay inspected and to receive a phytosanitary certificate. In addition, the following items are also quarantined: soil, compost, decomposed manure, humus, muck, and peat, separately or with other things; plants with roots with soil attached; grass sod; logs, pulpwood, and stumpwood; and used mechanized soil-moving equipment.

Texas Master Naturalist spends significant amounts of time learning and educating themselves through educational programs with experts and well educated professionals who teach aspects of nature right here in Marion and Harrison Counties.

Who sponsors these educational programs and events? The basic sponsors are Texas Parks and Wildlife and Texas Cooperative Extension. Local individuals and businesses are also heavily involved with development and resources.

What does a Texas Master Naturalist do? These Naturalists are fused by the bonds of nature and more specifically the nature of the Cypress Basin. There are several chapters across Texas called Master Naturalist who work together to gain their needed certification hours and programming needs.

A Master Naturalist is also a Master Volunteer who works together with other volunteers to complete wonderful projects for our community.

Texas Master Naturalist spends significant time in the class room learning about ecology and management of the Cypress Basin. They also spend several hours outside and on field trips.

Woody Bio-Mass

Is woody biomass a significant source of energy? We will get the answer to that and more later in the year. Our federal and state governments, private industries and others are investigating new forms of bio-fuels. One of those is woody bio-mass.

What is woody bio-mass? The big deal is the sugars that can be taken out of tree trunks, limbs and leaves using mechanical, chemical, and enzymatic processes.

The process to get crude oil from trees is too costly at this time, versus coal or oil. More research is needed to assess the benefits and drawbacks of producing ethanol from trees.

Ethanol production from woody bio-mass would significantly increase the value of our tree farms. The tree residues could be used for crude oil instead of being pushed in piles and burned.

On December 20, 2007 I visited the twelve food plots planted in September. On this trip I found that every food plot has been utilized to its max. Wildlife has placed tremendous pressure on these plants to produce. 10% is the most plant life left in any one food plot.

Figure 1 shows the most successful plot with the highest percentage of plants providing food for the wildlife.

Plants have survived freezing temperatures and many animals visiting. Johnny McNeely has placed a wildlife camera on the food plots. We hope to show the plots being utilized.

In Figure 2 you can see clover is doing very well. This is what the food plots would look like if no animals were allowed to graze on the plots.

Not all the plots look as healthy as the ones in Figure 2. The plants in Figure 3 are Rio Verde Lab Lab. It was unable to withstand the freezing temperatures. On the plots just planted with Lab Lab there are no other plants growing. The area outside the cage is bare as well.



December brought us closer to completing another piece of the puzzle in the Building Communities sessions. We learned about "Demographics and More" and how these economic and demographic information sources provide a wealth of information and data. Most of the data, stated the instructor, is what community leaders and economic development professionals still struggle to access and understand and what this information means for their communities. If used correctly, the data can be very helpful in building the confidence needed to assist local leaders in making informed decisions about local choices. Sources given were: Websites for finding county information through state websites, information on healthcare, transportation and income levels and how this data is ranked state and nationally in some cases. Population growth, expectations and how this data can be used to recruit and access needs for jobs, grants, documentation for papers and in recruitment efforts for business opportunities looking to locate to this area.

Students participating in the programs have benefited from a variety of expert speakers and are looking forward to the New Year and information in the concluding six months of classes. The classes are open to all interested persons, local or regional, those interested in certain classes or sessions, and are presented the second Friday of every month for one hour, from 10:00 to 11:00 AM. Students are asked to show up 30 minutes early so that any questions or concerns can be addressed. The sessions are virtually free. There maybe a very small cost for printing handouts and other materials needed for class sessions.

New members are welcome and invited to bring their group members with them if interested in looking for new ideas to improve their community or just trying to discover new trends or ideas for the new year. Future classes and dates are:

January 11, 2008 Clusters and Regions: Should We Focus on Clusters and Regions when looking to strengthen our economic development efforts? Do they lead to powerful information from which winning regional economic and workforce development strategies can be formed?

February 8, Attraction Strategies – Recruiting the Right Things: This session will discuss how today's global market place has not just changed the rules, but altered the game. The session will also address how the changing economy demands new forms of infrastructure and community assets in order to be attractive to today's workers, who themselves are key to sustainable business and economic growth.

March 14, Supporting Existing Businesses – The Case for Downtown Business Development.

Come learn the tools and resources needed to help support existing local businesses and create vibrant business districts. This program features an understanding of the changing marketplace and how communities can identify opportunities that are both realistic and sensible for their downtowns and communities.

April 11, Entrepreneurship – It's Good for Business, Government and the Civic Sector

This session will address entrepreneurship as a communities quality of life, how important it is and what the essential ingredients of successful entrepreneurship development are. Entrepreneurship projects will be highlighted as answers to possible questions.

May 9, Sustainable Development – Is It Going Mainstream? We will explore "What challenges and lessons does it offer to those of us working to enhance our communities?" What does it suggest in terms of new ways of doing business? Learn about new key elements in community development efforts.

June 13, Final Class – The Art and Science of Putting It All Together

UW-Extension Professor will reflect of over three decades of working with communities to address critical community development issues. He'll help us understand how and when to support a communities need to have an early success or take a step back to put a plan in place. The instructor offers a "real-world tempered" perspective on how to guide a community in making local, sustainable development choices.

The AARP/Diabetes Coalition group is a unique group of Seniors. Most belong to the AARP organization that meets on a monthly basis, (except June and July) usually the third Thursday of every month at 2:00 PM at Kellyville. They

host the annual driver's education program in August and an annual health fair in September or early October. Their meetings include an educational program that usually focuses on a health related issue or topic of concern for seniors. There is a socialization period and sometimes the meetings are centered on special events such as Valentines, Cinco de Mayo, and a trip in the summer and various parties for special events. The group is looking to add more members and new ideas to their annual fun filled calendar. The group is open to the public and will publish it's calendar of events following final approval at the January meeting.

Youth In Community Leadership Forum Held By Paulette Cooper

Last month more than 80 youth and adults participated in a youth issue forum centered around youth issues and how they can participate in youth/adult partnerships to enhance opportunities for youth to participate in their community. A variety of speakers addressed resources, problems caused by youth and ways of addressing these issues, ideas for improving the community, ideas for youth becoming involved in community service, and other topics related to inclusion and cultural diversity.

Speakers for the program included former "Youth In Community Leadership Program/RAP" members, Whitney McCoy and Leticia Hopkins, Marion County District Attorney, Bill Gleason, and Jefferson City Manager, Jim Gibson. The program is sponsored by the Cooperative Extension Program, Prairie View A&M University, the USDA- Cooperative State Research, Education, and Extension Service, Jefferson Independent School District, students involved in the "Communities In School Program", and other interested Jefferson Junior High students.

Over eighty issues that need to be addressed were identified by students. Some were closely related but, when the group was divided into eight smaller groups, the issues were some what narrowed as they learned about census and how to rank issues to be solved based on their likely hood of being solved in a timely manor, what resources are available and who will be able to help them solve their issue when thinking of volunteers and /or elected officials. Among the issues were bullying, community clean-ups, posting "Crime Watch", "Keep Our Community Clean", and "Drug Free" signs in troubled communities. Littering was also a concern. More after school activities and Adopt-A-Highway programs were also on the list. The final project has not been selected and youth will take one more look at the list during January and select one they are confident they can work to complete by May.

Youth continue to learn the skills needed to become involved in successful adult partnerships not only with their sponsors, but with other community leaders and elected officials.
